Write the word get on the whiteboard and ask the students what it means and to give some examples.

Put the students in pairs and give them two minutes to come up with as many meanings, uses and examples of the word get as they can, using the graphic as an example.

Suggested answers: **phrasal verbs** - get into, get in touch with, get through to someone, get through, get together, get round, get on with someone, get out of something, get on with something, get over, get behind someone, get away with

**different meanings** - understand, catch, arrive, capture, fetch, buy, hear, receive, pay for, obtain

**expressions with get** - get a life, get stuffed, get knotted, get a grip, get your act together, get a head of yourself, get off my back, get lost
