Read the different opinions below and answer the questions that follow.

A

To be honest, we're totally dependent on the tourist trade. If it weren't for the tourists we'd probably go under. We do get locals coming in and they like the food that we serve, but we need numbers. It's a big restaurant with high overheads to match and a good summer will see us through till the following year. During the season the place will be packed to the rafters most nights and when people are on holiday they tend to spend a bit more, especially on booze and that's a good earner for us. The locals tend to be a bit stingy.

B

I know that I will sound like I'm whinging, but I would prefer it if there weren't any tourists. I'm lucky enough to have been able to take early retirement, and I moved here for the sea air and a more relaxed pace of life away from the rat race. To be fair, I have that for about 8 months of the year but during the summer season it's a nightmare. The population of the city swells and you can't move. There are no parking places, there's litter everywhere and if you go out after 9 o'clock at night it's pretty much a dead cert that you'll get accosted by drunken yobs. There've always been tourists here but the last couple of years have been much worse. Ever since the cheap, low cost airlines started coming here the place has gone downhill.

\mathbf{C}

The more the merrier I say. I bought a couple of apartments in the city centre a few years ago as an investment and initially rented them out to students or young professionals. Once the low-cost airlines started bringing tourists in large numbers I kicked out the students and listed the apartments on Air b-n-b. My income more than doubled almost overnight. I'm looking to buy another couple of places to expand my portfolio, but I need to move fast as prices are really taking off. I suppose I feel a bit sorry for first time buyers and the like. It can be tough trying to get your foot on the property ladder but at the end of the day it's not my problem. You've got to look after number one, haven't you!

\mathbf{D}

It's a real problem. We've been saving for a deposit on a place but property prices are going through the roof right now. There's no way we could afford to buy a place at the moment. Even flats in the more downmarket neighbourhoods are being snapped up. It's always been fairly affluent and quite a desirable place to live but right now the situation is out of control. The low cost airlines are fuelling a kind of tourism boom. If you own a place you can make a killing renting it out to that market, and now everyone wants to get in on the act. The problem with that is that ordinary people like use get squeezed out, and in the long term you end up with a city full of tourists and rich pensioners.
